Shortstown Village Hall

After a decade or more of surveys, consultations and questionnaires and the persistence of the Shortstown Residents Association the new Village Hall is nearing completion. A grant from Eastcotts Parish Council using Section 106 money from Wimpy has enabled local builder Relmfield to start construction of the much needed new hall, which has reached the fitting out stage and is due to be handed over to the community in June.

The Parish Council have nominated Trustees to oversee the management of the new Village Hall on behalf of the community. A management group is going through its birth pangs surrounded by a cloud of catalogues on such diverse subjects as toilet brushes, curtains, chairs and tables plus a multitude of licensing regulations.

It is hoped that the Village Hall will be able to take bookings from September for children's birthday parties, wedding receptions, funeral wakes, special interest groups; the hall contains a smaller room for groups plus kitchen and usual offices. The pleasant site in Shorts Avenue is bounded by a recreation area including a football pitch and the BMX track.

The management group will be announcing the opening date and hall letting conditions in due course.

For all their support over the years we thank the Royal Airship Works club, the Parish Council, Sue Norman Halls adviser for BRCC Cardington for their support and the generous giving of their time.

The new Shortstown Village Hall will be an asset to the Village and the surrounding area. Please do all you can to support it by volunteering to help get the new hall off to a wonderful start in its service to the local community.

'Today is the first day of the rest of your lives'

Dear Parishioners,

There is an old cliché which goes: 'Today is the first day of the rest of your life' and, as with all clichés, it contains a simple truth expressed in hackneyed words. But for Christian people today the old words ring true. Easter Day is indeed the beginning of new life for us and not here on earth, but of our eternity. Today the world is not just new, not just different from yesterday, but completely re-created. It is as though the world in its entirety had turned on its axis to face another direction. Before this day occurred all the traditional beliefs about living and dying were clear and unequivocal. Human beings were created by a distant, all-seeing God who rewarded and punished according to divine justice and our fate after death was a mystery. Then came the man Jesus, who told of many things beyond simple human comprehension, and belief in him was based on the goodness of the person and the miracles he performed. Until that first Easter Day when his full truth and meaning became clear, when God and love ceased being simple words and became dynamic actions, reverberating through our past history and on into the un-seeable and unknowable future – for us on this Easter Day and beyond.

So what does 're-creation' and 'a new order' mean for us? How do the promises of Christ and the proof of who he is affect our daily living? On Easter Day we are reminded that Christ has moved through death, reassuring us that we have nothing to fear. The world is re-created and we are re-created. We have become a new people with a new future. The old ways and fears have dissolved in the waters of new life which Jesus gives us. We can feel safe in the knowledge that Christ who died and now lives will never leave his people again. Easter Day is the day for hearing the rustle of new leaves turning over, a day to celebrate to share our delight in the promise of this new future that has been given to us, and a day to be proud as Christians and unafraid to say so. So relax and join us on Easter Day at 10.30am to join in this celebration ... because our God has proved his love and 'Today is the first day of the rest of your eternity!'

I leave you with the words of the prayer, the collect, that we will all say together on Easter Day...

The Garden of Remembrance

The Garden has always been available for people who live in the area for the burial of the ashes of loved ones, and we hope that by improving the appearance of the Garden, and enabling people to fix memorial plaques to the new wall, more people will feel that they would like to use this facility.

Easter Biscuits

Ingredients

110g / 4oz Caster sugar
110g / 4oz butter
1 egg separated
225g / 8oz plain flour
Good pinch mixed spice
55g / 2oz currants
30g / 2oz candied peel
3 tbsp milk
Extra caster sugar to finish

Method

Heat oven to 160°C / 325°F / gas mark 3. Grease a baking sheet.
Cream the butter and the sugar until it is light and fluffy, then add the egg yolk.
Sieve in the flour folding it into the mixture and add the spice, currants and peel.
Add a small amount of milk to make a stiff dough.
Roll out the dough and cut out desired shapes, place on baking sheet and cook for 10 mins.
Take out of the oven and brush the top with egg white and sprinkle on some of the extra caster sugar and return it to the oven and cook for a further 5-10 mins.

Tunes of Glory

THE NEW ENGLISH HYMNAL

The last year 2006 has seen the celebration of the centenary of *The English Hymnal*, and much has been written about it. Before, in 1906 when it was first published there had been for some time a committee consisting of the Revd. Percy Dearmer and like-minded colleagues, who worked upon a hymn book that was originally intended as a supplementary to other hymnals. However a new hymnal was in fact produced, the musical editorship being entrusted to Dr Ralph Vaughan Williams. This had followed *Hymns Ancient and Modern*, its complete edition being in 1889, and which had reigned supreme, and in use in more than 80% of parishes and cathedrals.

Much later in 1975, the supplement *English Praise*, was published, containing hymns and carols old and new that were worthy of a place alongside *EH*. *The New English Hymnal* was then produced, and has been largely adopted in most of the parishes that hitherto had used the old book, and it has been a great success. The Preface to *NEH* is very informative, about the changes that have taken place during the twentieth century in theological understanding, and modes of worship. Nevertheless in the new Preface the erstwhile presence of Percy Dearmer is still not far away. The *NEH* is comfortable with hymns which use 'Thou' in addressing the Almighty, it continues the traditions of the original, in promoting hymns and music that enhance worship, and give greater glory to God in his people's offering of the sacrifice of praise.

To celebrate the centenary, a supplement to *The New English Hymnal* has now been published, entitled *New English Praise*, intended to complement it. It has fifty hymns, some new, some old, plus a very interesting liturgical section with participatory material, including responsorial psalms, for choir and congregation. The Church year is comprehensively covered and congregational music is provided for the sprinkling with baptismal water at the feast of the Baptism of Christ, and at Easter Eve, for Candlemas and for Corpus Christi, as well as for Advent, Holy Week and Easter.

If there is one hymn which sums up the spirit of the original *English Hymnal* it is "Come down, O lover divine", a magnificent hymn, inspired by the account in Acts of the first day of Pentecost. Its metre was unique, and therefore no suitable tune existed. However Vaughan Williams composed a tune to fit the words and called it *Down Ampney*, after his beloved Gloucestershire village where he was born in 1812.
